It is with great sadness that we report the death of Dr Jim Bradley on 22nd January 2016.

Jim was a valuable member and loyal supporter of UALL for many years including his service on the UALL Executive Committee (2009-2013) and as Vice Chair of UALL, Scotland (SUALL). It was Jim who invited us to hold our 2011 Annual Conference at the University of Stirling.

Jim joined the University of Stirling, Division of Academic Innovation and Continuing Education, working on projects to widen participation. After that, at various times, he was Director of the Access Programme and Teaching Qualification in Further Education. A tireless advocate for adult learners and inclusion, he was also endlessly innovative and energetic in trying to develop different approaches. In recent years he had great success in developing European networks and EU funded projects on adult learning. He also played an active role in the University and College Union over many years. His illness and subsequent retirement were a great shock to the many who worked with him.
